
Term Three is well and truly in full swing in the Library. As usual, the new books keep flooding in, with some fabulous authors and titles arriving in recent weeks.

- **Hey Kiddo**, by Jarrett J. Krosoczka, is an engaging GRAPHIC NOVEL based on Jarrett's life growing up, living with his grandparents, and dealing with an addict mother and absent father.
- My Name is NOT Peaseblossom is a riotous appropriation of Shakespeare's Midsummer Night's

This is an important part of reading. Thinking about what is likely to happen next enhances understanding (and can also create a pleasant surprise or shock if the unexpected happens!)

Good readers form pictures in their minds.

Forming pictures in your mind as you read helps you to stay focused, increases your comprehension and enhances your imagination...

SCHOOL UNIFORM

- A meeting of WHS Community Support Group last month reviewed our Uniform. They wish to clarify some points with students and their parents/carers.
- Summer Uniform— Navy mid-thigh length shorts with WHS polo shirts for both boys and girls.
- Winter Uniform— Navy track pants with WHS polo shirt and WHS jumpers.
- Appropriate shoes or leather boots are to be worn for Ag, Food Technology, Industrial Arts, Science and any other subject where protection is required.

The shorts are to be plain navy with **NO** logos or piping. They can be Canterbury or any other brand.



The girls can also wear tailored navy shorts. These can be purchased from the school uniform shop.

The uniform is the same for boys and girls.





Seniors can wear the plain white shirt in Years 11 and 12.

Plain navy skirts can also be worn by the girls.

The boys can also wear plain grey shorts in summer, or long grey pants in winter.

- The school will be looking to sell shorts later this term. Notification will be made when they will be available to order.
- Please be aware that now the Community Support Group has met and confirmed the uniform for WHS, we are asking students to now make changes to their uniform that will bring them into line with this decision.
- Phone calls will be made home if students are found to be wearing inappropriate uniform.
